## CARES ACT MONEY

The City received a notice that we are due to receive \$141,375 of CARES Act money making it a total of \$424,125. City anticipates official documentation of awarded amount soon. Funds will be used for business grants and City reimbursable items. The money cannot be used for revenue loss suffered by the City.

## COVID-19 SMALL BUSINESS GRANTS

Applications are being reviewed and, if eligible, will be awarded in order using the received date and time stamp. Grant recommendations will come in front of the Council at the City Council Meeting on September 22, 2020.




## STREET TREE AND SIDEWALK

## WATER PRODUCTION

Below is the monthly water production report. For the month of August, the City produced 75.3M gallons or 10M cubic feet. For 2020, the peak production, which is normally seen in July and August, has been lower this year by 15.2M gallons or 2M cubic feet. This reduction is contributed to milder temperatures this summer.

## DUPONT FIRE DEPARTMENT

**Total Calls for Service 9/2 – 9/9/2020: 21**

### Call Highlights

- A private ambulance was available 55% of the time and averaged over a 24-minute response time.
- Under our mutual aid agreement with surrounding jurisdictions, DuPont Fire deployed to the fire off HWY 410. DFD was assigned to protect homes at several locations. Our actions along with other units saved several homes and entire developments.
